"Faith During Faithlessness" Sermon Series Study Guide

Big Idea of the Series: The book of 2 Kings covers almost 250 years of the divided kingdoms of Israel and Judah, focusing on rulers, prophets, and the many different kings that ultimately led the Hebrew people to the Babylonian exile. This series will consider six people whose chose to remain with God or to turn away from him. Through relevant application, you will see how following God or turning from Him can lead to similar outcomes.

Week 1: Elijah and Elisha

Text: 2 Kings 2:1–14 **Topic**: God's Authority

Big Idea of the Message: For a period of time, Elisha would become the central prophet of both kingdoms following Elijah's departure. Miracles would accentuate Elisha's authority in God's name.

Application Point: When God calls us to follow him, he will empower us to do so.

- 3. In what ways does the story of Elijah and Elisha speak about God's plan and order for our lives?
- 4. In what ways would it be encouraging to know that God didn't just stop with Elijah?

Healing – What are you learning about God and yourself?

5. Can you think of a time when God acted in a similar way toward you?

Week 2: Jehu

Text: 2 Kings 9:1–13

Topic: Justice

Big Idea of the Message: Jehu would become God's tool for addressing the

wickedness of King Ahab's family.

Application Point: Sometimes God uses us to make amends for actions of the past. At times He will call us to repay goodness and other times we will be the vessel He uses to settle a debt.

Story - What's taking place?

- 1. What is the main story or themes that stood out to you from this week's verses in 2 Kings and from Sunday's message?
- 2. Name one person who positively impacted your life. How did they do this?

Wound/Tension - How does this experience affect you or your outlook:

3. Jehu had the responsibility of bringing a reckoning on the house of Ahaz. Why do you think God used Jehu and didn't just find a way to ruin Ahaz's legacy?

Healing - What are you learning about God and yourself?

- 4. In what ways would Jehu's actions bring God glory?
- 5. Can you think of ways God could use people today to both bring retribution for others and glory to himself (e.g., attorneys using law degrees to help aid people enslaved in different countries; humanitarian projects that help bring food, water, and education to countries ravaged by civil war; civil rights activists in America, etc.)?

Week 3: Joash

Text: 2 Kings 11:21–12:18 **Topic**: Accountability

Big Idea of the Message: We must make choices to remain faithful to God's

expectations even when it would seem easier not to do so.

Application Point: God calls us to examine the things we consider important in

our lives and take measures to correct wrong priorities.

<u>Discussion Questions: Use the extra space below to write out your answers.</u>

Story - What's taking place?

- 1. What was one main theme that stood out to you from the verses?
- 2. What is the most difficult decision you had to make this past week? Do you think it will change the course of direction for people close to you? In what ways?

Wound/Tension - How does this experience affect you or your outlook?

3. Joash was a strong leader so long as he was led by Jehoiada; however, when Jehoiada died, Joash seemed to lose his moral compass. Why do you think this was? What could he have done to prevent this?

Healing - What are you learning about God and yourself?

- 4. Who is one person you would say influenced you most positively and how? Negatively and how?
- 5. Joash didn't seem to finish his race strong. What would a person need to do in order to finish strong?

Call – What is God showing you from this experience to help encourage others?

6.	How do you believe God is leading you to be a person that lives a life of accountability towards yourself and others?

Week 4: Hoshea and the Fall of Samaria

Text: 2 Kings 17:1–23 **Topic**: Fear in Trusting

Big Idea of the Message: Disobeying God's expectations is a recipe for disaster. **Application Point:** The line between worshiping God and other gods can be easily crossed when we fail to commit fully to trusting Him.

<u>Discussion Questions: Use the extra space below to write out your</u> answers.

Story - What's taking place?

- 1. How has the idea of trusting God stood out to you from this week's verses in 2 Kings and from Sunday's message?
- 2. What do these verses say about God as a judge?

Wound/Tension - How does this experience affect you or your outlook?

- 3. In what ways did Israel and Judah both fail to honor God's expectations?
- 4. In what ways would you say the same failures are either present in the church or at least seem to be going in the same direction? What do you think God's warning to us today would be?

Healing - What are you learning about God and yourself?

5. What idols do you think we might be guilty of worshiping in our lives? How could we go about destroying them?

Call – What is God showing you from this experience to help encourage others?

6.	In what ways do you sense God calling you into a deeper place of trust with Him and to be a person of trust for others?

Week 5: Hezekiah and Assyria Text: 2 Kings 18:1–12; 19:14–19 Topic: Dependence on God **Big Idea of the Message**: Trust of and obedience to God are the keys to answering life's greatest challenges.

Application Point: When God says He will be faithful, we must accept that His faithfulness is worthy of trust. He has a proven track record.

Story - What's taking place?

1. What is the main story or themes that stood out to you from the verses during Sunday's message and what you just read?

Wound/Tension – How does this experience affect you or your outlook?

- 2. How important are our parents in the way we grow up?
- 3. How does Hezekiah's story challenge your answer to #2?

Healing – What are you learning about God and yourself?

- 4. Can you think of someone who went the opposite way of their parents, in a positive way? How so?
- 5. Hezekiah took it upon himself to truly "be the change" in Judah. In what ways did he go about cleaning the house of the Lord?

Call – What is God showing you from this experience to help encourage others?

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Week 6: Josiah

Text: 2 Kings 22:1–4,11–20; 23:4–23

Topic: Obedience

Big Idea of the Message: God's calling in our lives will have impact on those around us and those yet to come. We must always be watching for his lead so that we might follow him.

Application Point: The most important lesson we can learn in life is to serve God with abandon so that He can be honored regardless of what the outcome may be.

Story - What's taking place?

1. When it comes to these passages of scripture, how has obedience been instrumental in your life story?

Wound/Tension – How does this experience affect you or your outlook?

- 2. In what ways did Josiah spur a revival in Judah?
- 3. What were some of the things he had to do in order to make way for that to happen?

Healing - What are you learning about God and yourself?

4. How might we need to model ourselves after Josiah's leadership to make way for revival in our own lives? Our churches?

Call – What is God showing you from this experience to help encourage others?

5. Who is one person that you believe has allowed the Holy Spirit to stir revival in his or her heart? What kinds of changes came about? How can you encourage this change in others?

Week 7 Series Message – "Stories of Faith"
For the last section of the study, take some time and reflect on some of the key
learnings that you discovered throughout this series and write or journal them
down. Don't rush through this time. Allow the Holy Spirit to lead you to reflect and
show you some areas that God may be refining in your heart and life. When you
hear stories of faith during difficult times like this series brought out, there is
something about these stories that God can use to draw us closer to Him.

allow the Holy Spirit to do the deeper work.
